



Rotary Haenertsburg's proposed Global Grant for a complete training module for 20 Early Childhood Development Practitioners through the Thusanang Trust

Good day!

Gathered from presentations done by the club and off the Rotary website and other sites, here is an indication of the ambitious plan our club is busy with.

What is a Global Grant?

In short: a project initiated by one club with funds they have raised, topped up by their own district (in our case most of the 'Old Transvaal, Swaziland, Botswana and Southern Mozambique) and in partnership with at least one international partner club and district. This is then matched by The Rotary Foundation. The result is that funds we raise are geared way beyond what we could raise ourselves.

Not-for-Profit Service Organization

Rotary International is one of the largest not-for-profit service organizations in the world, with more than one million members actively participating in thousands of local clubs spread across 161 countries around the world. From its headquarters in Evans-ton, Illinois, Rotary International provides its members with the opportunity to address such issues as [AIDS](#), homelessness, polio, lack of education, hunger, and other national and international problems. Rotary International Foundation contributes nearly \$100 million every year toward humanitarian programs in which Rotary members participate and voluntarily raise funds. More than any other membership organization throughout the [United States](#), the members of Rotary International have been able to claim that they put "Service Above Self." (possibly dated as figures quoted include 1998)

Since the first donation of \$26.50 in 1917, the Foundation has received contributions totaling more than \$1 billion. (2014 figure)

Simply put, the funding from The Rotary Foundation towards Global Grants comes from the interest on this capital.

Here are a few notes and an example of how a Global Grant might be put together, off the Rotary website:

A key feature of global grants is partnership, between the district or club where the activity is carried out and a district or club in another country. Both sponsors must be qualified before they can submit an application.

Ensure that all figures are whole numbers

* Contributions from the international partner must be a minimum of 30%.

** Minimum World Fund match is \$15,000. Maximum World Fund match is \$200,000.

*** Please identify the source(s) of other funding. Note that outside funding added here is not matched by TRF. The Foundation will match non-Rotarian contributions provided they do not come from a cooperating organization or a beneficiary of the project. Contributions eligible for a match should be added in the section above.

The minimum budget for a global grant activity is \$30,000. The Foundation's World Fund provides a minimum of \$15,000 and maximum of \$200,000. Clubs and districts contribute District Designated Funds (DDF) and/or cash contributions that the World Fund matches. DDF is matched at 100% and cash is matched at 50%.

PROGRAMS

PolioPlus. Since 1985, Rotary members have helped immunize more than 2.5 billion children against polio. Today, all but three countries are free of polio. As of June 2014, Rotary had committed more than \$1.3 billion to global polio eradication to ensure that polio is eliminated in the last three countries where it remains and that it does not return elsewhere. **In 2013-14, program awards, including PolioPlus Partners grants, totaled \$128.9 million.**


Rotary Peace Centers. Each year, the Foundation funds study by peace fellows at six Rotary Peace Centers, where they earn master's degrees or professional development certificates. Since 2002-03, more than 875 fellows from more than 120 countries have participated, at a cost of \$49.6 million. **In 2013-14, there were 98 Rotary Peace Fellows from 41 countries, and program awards for the fellows and the Rotary Peace Centers totaled \$5.3 million.**

District grants. District grants support smaller-scale, short-term projects related to the Foundation's mission. **In 2013-14, the Foundation approved 488 district grants, and program awards totaled \$23.5 million.**


Global grants. Global grants support large-scale international activities with sustainable, measurable outcomes that support Rotary's areas of focus; activities include humanitarian projects, scholarships, and vocational training teams. **In 2013-14, the Foundation approved 868 global grants, and program awards totaled \$47.3 million.**

Packaged grants. Packaged grants, which also support the areas of focus, have been carried out with the Foundation's strategic partners. **In 2013-14, the Foundation approved 18 packaged grants, and program awards totaled \$530,000.** Note: Packaged grants were ended as of October 2014.

► ECD – Early Childhood Development

- In conjunction with our local NGO, the Thusanang Trust, who are accredited and highly experienced trainers;
- We have sponsored training of ECD practitioners using Matching Grants (originally), District Grants and currently we are preparing to apply for a Global Grant (about which more later)
- Also, in co-operation with International Partner Clubs, partners like Round Table, and on our own with the help of the local communities, we have built crèches through Thusanang, besides helping to train the ECD practitioners in their accredited courses.

An entire accredited training module including practical on-site training and evaluation for 20 ECD practitioners through Thusanang Trust over an 18 month period.

Budget: just over R620 000 (US\$51 700)

Our total income as a club is currently under R150 000 per year; we are hoping to have around 1/8th of the total or R77 500 available for this project from our own funds.
